MINISTER REPORT: IAN M GUY

As I begin this report I refer you to page 4. There you will read of our mission, vision, values, goals. These highlight who we are and why we are here, and at times they may help explain why we do some of the things we do. Most of what you see there is long standing with the goals being most recent yet even they stretch back to 2014.

Flowing from the goals we have seen it very natural to add a worship service or to encourage small groups as we seek to invite people to know Christ; likewise part of our DNA has been to seek ways to be a positive influence in the community: thus we serve where we can, we have worked with other churches and agencies to support the community, we have provided things like mainly music, pasta café, remarkable readers, money, parenting, marriage and pre-marriage courses. We partner with others to further this work - hence the relationship with Baskets of Blessing, the provision of rooms for plunket, adult literacy, AA, the Christmas lunch and the list goes on.

Partnering is seen in our global mission projects also - what we do in Nepal and Vanuatu is all about coming alongside of those who are there doing the work, to encourage, strengthen, resource, train, and to celebrate successes, lament loss, and through it all to look to God.

Partnering is at the heart of how we operate. The Wakatipu Presbyterians in one form or another have been in this district for over 155 years and in all that time, as far as I can tell, there has never been just one stand-alone congregation in the Wakatipu. From the beginning of ministry here we were scattered preaching places, held together by our shared faith and recognition that to serve here we were at our best when serving together.

Over the years congregations, people, ministries have come and gone. At times some parts of the church have flourished, others have struggled, yet even in the struggle remained faithful and fruitful expressions of the Church of the Lord.

Over the past decade we have seen tremendous investment into Arrowtown, into the Global community, and we now celebrate the wisdom of those decisions; and in the last couple of years we have made a small beginning in Kingston. At the same time some projects have not worked as planned or endured as hoped. This is true of some of the small groups, outreaches, and most notably the 5 Mile Project. Yet again even in the setbacks we have seen the strength of the whole in resourcing, in encouraging, in counselling, in challenging one another to be the best we can be as we seek to worship God and serve our Wakatipu community.

Our past gives me hope for the future. The challenges before us are immense. We must invest more in the younger generations, we must seek ways to build stronger ties in the community, and we must address the challenge of our buildings. Flicking back through annual reports and minutes of the Church Council it is obvious this has been a hot topic for well over 20 years. Some progress was achieved in 2011 with the new hall in Arrowtown - today as we gather for our annual meeting in this space we give thanks for the foresight, generosity and courage of those who enabled this to be built. It was costly, it was controversial, it was built to meet a need that did not then exist. But look at how much good has been enabled because of the building of the St John's hall. It has proven a blessing to community and church.

Going forward we will need the same cross-congregation co-operation, resourcing, praying, dreaming God's dreams and sheer hard-working to ensure that all of our buildings be fit for purpose, and that our mission plans in these communities and beyond thrive.

I found the first 6 months following our 2021 Annual Meeting hard going, covid restrictions lingered a little longer than I had anticipated and for a time the various responses to covid divided us. It meant that we could no longer meet together as we had and we found it difficult at times to listen to one another. Some seemed to give up on church through this time - and others left the region for opportunity elsewhere.

Yet I have been reminded that God does '...know the plans I have for you', and that God's plans '...give us hope and a future'. Jeremiah 29:11-12

Of course, there is another verse to be added to that. Verse 13 'You will seek me and find me when you seek me with all your heart'.

We are called to a life of discipleship - a life of walking with Jesus, of committing our hopes and dreams to him, of seeking him and serving him with all of our heart. There is no room for half-heartedness and complacency in the disciple's life.

Thus, as we come to the 2022 Annual Meeting we are spending 40 Days in Prayer - our desire is to know the Lord and to know the Lord's plans for us.

I am reminded of our Mission Statement: To live in Christ, and to grow as a community of faith, hope, love & joy, and I ask you in what ways are you paying attention to your Christian maturity? In what ways are you encouraging maturity in others?

And our vision to see growth in *God's Kingdom One Life at a Time*, reminds us to look beyond ourselves as we help others know Christ and to live in Christ.

In February this year I completed 10 years as Minister in this place. In my role as minister and team leader I am blessed and appreciative of all God has given us. I thank you for the encouragement and support you offer to Amanda and myself. I give thanks that God has blessed us with diverse congregations, amazing people, disciples of the Lord Jesus.

I give thanks that we are a church of the nations for the nations and that together we are seeking to serve and to save, to bless and to love those who are near and afar.

I am thankful to be part of a ministry team that sees each of us focused upon our primary calling yet here to encourage, inspire, and strengthen the whole.

I give thanks for our Church Clerk - Shirley Watson, and am in awe of the work-load she carries, and for the invaluable contributions of Kim Wilkinson (Property & Finance) and David McNeill (Treasurer).

I acknowledge the contribution of Meilita Manusama as she leaves our employ after serving us graciously and humbly this past 5 years and thank God for bringing Daniele Vianna to continue the work.

And I am thankful that I get to serve in this place with Amanda by my side - her encouragement, patience, love and wisdom are a very real strength that I receive every day.

The last few years have been challenging and across the Church we have farewelled many people, yet by God's grace our Lord is bringing new opportunities, new people, a new day is dawning. Thus, I look forward in confidence - the Lord is our God, and we are God's people, and God gives us hope and a future.

So much has happened over the last year that parts of it seem to blur. I said something similar last year too! God is faithful, and it is good to see him working amongst us and leading us and growing us.

The easiest place to start actually is to give thanks for those who have served and lead in various roles - the elders and property team, the children's leaders, the Mainly Music team, the music-worship team, those who serve morning tea and those who look after the church grounds, those who lead our discipleship groups (see their reports), those who host the shared church lunches and hosted the marriage course.

Thanks to you who turn up on Sundays to worship God and grow in your faith and do life following Jesus with others. It is a joy and privilege to be your pastor. Thank you for your prayers and care of me and my family.

I am also grateful to the ministry team: Ian, Clay, and Claudio. We meet regularly. Pastorally supporting one another, praying for each other, dreaming together, discerning, planning together, leading together.

This term we started a discipleship group for our teenagers on Sunday mornings. They are exploring key questions of faith. We will run a couple of social events this terms with the teenagers from our other congregations. Our first one was this month, taking them ten-pin bowling.

The children's ministry has grown for us this year. I performed my first baptism since I have been at St John's, Luca Pilgrim, Sarah and Amos' baby boy. This was a joyful celebration for us as a congregation. It is encouraging seeing the kids grow in their faith and participate in the life of the church. We raised finances to employ a children's worker 4 days a week. We are still looking for this person

Eight couples did the Alpha Marriage Course in August-September, including Sarah and myself. The material was excellent, and everyone found things throughout the course that strengthened their marriage. We hope to run this again in term 3 next year.

The shared lunches are one of our practices of hospitality together. They build relationships and have often been a place where new people have found a connection point. During each term we have stated to have an all-age extended worship service.

I finished my time on the Arrowtown Primary School Board but remain as the chair for the Baskets of Blessing Board (see the BoB report for the work they do).

I took a refreshing period of study leave for most of December into early January which flowed into annual leave. The study leave was a leisurely reading through the Bible and doing a twelve-week self-lead Ignatian Retreat. I am grateful to those from St John's who lead services and preached. And for the team who ran a family-orientated picnic carol service which was a hit.

Next year I am in the early stages of exploring further study leave to do a 30-day silent (can you imagine!!) Ignatian retreat as a prerequisite to doing a spiritual director's course.

And so here we are, almost at Christmas for another year. I look forward with anticipation to what 2023 holds for us as a church and what adventures God leads us into as we follow Jesus together.

ST MARGARET'S - FRANKTON

The year was again shaped by covid and responding to ever changing regulations which had a significant impact on worship. To meet our obligations during the 'traffic light' system the elders implemented a change to Sunday morning worship by providing an early service that was 'vaccine pass not required' and a later service that did require a 'vaccine pass'. This created some personnel challenges but did mean that no one was excluded from in person worship. We were aware that Ian was also preparing a service on YouTube which ensured that everyone had an option. Once restrictions were ended we were delighted to come back together as a whole congregation.

To celebrate this Amanda organised a Guess Who is Coming to Dinner - the uptake for this was excellent and many enjoyed a fun evening of good food and fellowship. We have also begun a monthly pattern of sharing lunch on Communion Sundays. We are still getting into the flow of this, but it has been good to spend time together and get to know one another in a deeper way.

Another initiative to help families reconnect was a Family Fun night in July at the Frankton church.

However, it has been disappointing to note that many individuals and families are no longer regular at worship, and some have slipped away altogether. This factor along with the reality that we have farewelled many people over the year does mean that our congregation is smaller than it had been prior to the pandemic and because of the extended work schedules of many regular attendance has also been impacted. This has been seen in particular amongst our Footsteps families.

Our children's Christmas service last year was based around a play called Dr Luke - this was written by Robin Winter. Those who participated in the service went away impacted by the hard work of the children and their faithful leaders.

Remarkable Readers led by Judy Holland have had a quiet year in that the school remained closed to them because of pandemic restrictions until recently. Thankfully the doors were recently opened, and the team returned to the school on Wednesday 19th October. The children were excited to see them and each member of the team was given a little goodie bag and made to feel very special.

Eldership: Earlier in the year Janet Rutherford and Amanda Guy were ordained as elders following their election by the congregation - it has been good to have their added experience and wisdom available to the team. However, we also farewelled Thunes and Kitty Cloete to Napier. As an elder Thunes served the congregation at worship and behind the scenes; and as a couple they are deeply missed. We pray for them as they continue to seek the Lord in their new community.

A congregation is not just served by the minister or the elders but by many. So to those who serve in Bible reading, praying, singing, playing, welcoming, visiting, hosting, serving, cleaning, mowing, maintaining, improving we say thank you.

We have continued to be spiritually fed by solid biblical teaching from the preaching team of Ian Guy, Lindsay Key, Bronnie Hartley, Cláudio Gonçalves, Stephen Bond, Felipe Aguiar, Clay Peterson and others.

Going forward we need to invest in children and family's ministry and in our facilities, and while it may be tempting to leave these challenges for another day we believe we must find a way forward on these matters quickly. Thanks be to God who equips and leads and for whom we live.

It has been great to know that every Sunday we have approximately twenty people watching live, and others are watching during the week. One of the services available online have reached more than a hundred views in a few days. We have people in other nations following our services and the comments seem to be very positive. God only knows how far our preaching is going. We're still working with very simple cameras and our goal is to be able to improve this ministry by the purchase of a professional gear and improved lighting at the church. Children and Teenagers

We have a heart for the new generation. We know how teaching our kids and teens must be a priority if we long to see the church thriving in the future. The challenges of raising our families in a completely different culture are many, that's why our leaders are working hard to minister to our children at every Sunday, with meaningful and deep lessons from the Scriptures. Our goal is to give them tools to overcome the world of unbelief they found at school and in the



society in general. Our number of kids can vary throughout the year, reaching 20 kids when they are all together. Teenagers seem more settled with the average number of 7 attendees in their meetings and activities. **Michele** and **Cassia** lead these ministries with so much love and care. All the parents are grateful for their work and commitment.

Couple's Dinner

Recently our Women's prayer group organised a Couple's Dinner. This was a wonderful opportunity for couples to have a special time together. The food was beautiful and the decoration was carefully done to bring an Italian atmosphere to the hall in Arrowtown.

Another blessing this year was the installation of a new coffee machine-many of the team felt that part of the Manna ministry was sharing good coffee together and went ahead to contribute generously to fund a new machine.

KINGSTON REPORT

"35... Open your eyes and look at the fields! They are ripe for harvest. ³⁶Even now the one who reaps receives wages and gathers the harvest for eternal life, so that the sower and the reaper may rejoice together." John 4.35.36

With much gratitude to our God and to rejoice together with you, we share in this report some of the challenges, achievements, and blessings in this Kingston Presbyterian planting work.

Sunday Services

Throughout 2022 we have been encouraged by God to continue serving Him in this very rewarding work. We started the year with the challenge of holding 3 Sunday services a month, two in Kingston and one in Garston. At first, we were apprehensive about the attendance of the members, as previously it was only one service a month. But by the grace of God, they gradually got used to it and today they regularly attend Sunday services.

In our services we worship God with prayers, hymns, songs, offerings, Bible reading, preaching and the Lord's table. Members also participate with



Bible reading, prayer or even leading some services during our absence. Our morning tea after the service has been an essential moment for us to deepen the relationships between the brothers and sisters.

Despite various restrictions due to the "Covid19 Vaccination Pass" requirement during the first four months of the year our activities at Kingston Presbyterian Church continued as normal. Some of these services had to be online, but with the effective participation of the church.

In the second semester many of our services were held in the St John's rooms because the Golf Club was undergoing a renovation with a window glass shattering and carpet replacement. Thank God we have both the St. John's rooms and Garston Church available to us when needed.

Evangelism

We have taken advantage of commemorative dates in the calendar, such as Easter, Mother's Day, and Christmas, to make some celebrations, special tributes and, above all, to make our church known in the community and invite people to participate with us in worship.

On Mother's Day, like last year, we offer every family in Kingston, Garston and the region a Mother's Day 2022 Magnetic Refrigerator Calendar. We distributed the calendars from house to house on the Sunday after worship, we leave it in some public places. Along with the calendar, we also delivered the Hope booklet and an invitation with the schedule of services.



In April we had a special Easter service at Garston Presbyterian Church. With nearly all members in attendance and two more new families from Kingston and Garston visiting. After the service, we had a lovely Easter lunch at the Gordons' farm.

To improve our church's community outreach, in addition to announcing our schedules through Kingston Trading, we now also advertise on the Kingston Community Page, Kingston Bulletin and sometimes the Garston School Newsletter. With that, we have had a return with the presence of

different visitors in the services in both Kingston and Garston. We pray that they will come back again and continue to worship with us. We have an average of 15 people attending our Sunday services in Garston or Kingston; and we are happy and excited about the prospects for spiritual and numerical growth in this new Church.

Pastoral Care

This year we had a demand from many brothers and sisters in need of personal care due to illness or surgery. The church mobilized to assemble basic baskets, send gifts and we still had the very important and fundamental support of "Baskets of Blessing" with frozen foods, which we are immensely grateful. We made several visits to the brothers throughout the year, praying and sharing a word of encouragement from God.

Trip to Brazil

This was our first trip back to Brazil after 5 years of arriving in New Zealand. The main reasons for this trip were to visit and thank the various churches in Brazil that have been our financial and spiritual support in this mission field, and report on our work both here in New Zealand and Nepal during these years. The Brazilian brothers and sisters were happy to hear about the development of the church plantation in Kingston, as they are also part of this project. Although we had an extremely tight schedule, we also had the opportunity to visit our family and friends. Unfortunately, we were not able to increase the number of partner churches to improve our income, which has been decreasing significantly each year due to inflation and exchange rate instability of the Brazilian currency against the New Zealand dollar.

Relationship with Wakatipu and Lumsden Church

On 30th of January, we celebrated our first anniversary of transitioning Kingston Presbyterian Church from Lumsden Presbyterian Church to Wakatipu Presbyterian Church. After the service, we all gathered in Kingston's Park for a picnic by the lake. It was a wonderful time to see some of our brethren from Lumsden Church.

Faith Thinking

It has been good to be able to offer the Faith Thinking Short Courses to the Church and community this year. Faith Thinking is a joint venture between the Theology Programme of the University of Otago and the Church and supported by Continuing Education at the University of Otago.

During this time of disruption we have continued to provided some financial support and from a distance offered encouragement and prayer. A return to Vanuatu is hoped for mid-2023.



During the period from May 18th to June 2nd I was on a mission trip to Nepal to follow the face-to-face return of the training of the 20 local leaders and interview them individually to find out how the development of the churches is going and its challenges.. Most told us that



despite religious persecution, poverty and the aftermath of the pandemic, the church in Nepal is growing for the glory of God. We were privileged to visit Hasta Memorial School and witness the wonderful work that Anjali Tamang and her team have done in the region



in preventing child sex trafficking. Anjali is very grateful for the support Wakatipu Presbyterian Church has given to her and the school. Badri and Simon who we support in their church planting work also say how grateful they are for the support given.

I would like to take the opportunity to

thank you again for the resources lovingly offered by church members to pay for airline tickets; this demonstrates the missionary zeal, affection, and generosity of this beloved church.


In addition, we have links with organisations dedicated to the support of young people. The **Apple of God's Eyes** (AoGE) is an organisation dedicated to the restoration of girls who have returned to Nepal after having been trafficked. They run homes for 200 girls, a school, and medical and dental clinics which are also available to the community.

Funding for this is a mix of self-funding plus grants made from your specific giving, fund-raising and the Ministers discretionary fund.

Hasta Memorial School


It has been an exciting year to be involved with the HASTA MEMORIAL SCHOOL

Since our last Annual Meeting the initial building work was completed and the school opened to students on the 20th September 2021.



Progress since then has been steady and in August 2022 it was a proud day when the 100th student began classes.

Some building work continues as accommodation is needed for students who live too far from school to make the trip every day and guest rooms are also on the way. Currently our main financial involvement is the provision of scholarships for 29 students: this is provided by approximately 69 individuals some from within the church but most from other parts of New Zealand. This money enables everyone to attend who desires to and ensures the financial stability of the school. These photos are of some of our supported children.

In April, the children had final exams and assessments as this was the end of the Nepali school year. Our teachers created beautiful, hand-decorated packets to share each child's first year results at parent-teacher conferences. We were delighted to see that almost all of our school families sent a parent or grandparent representative to meet with the child's teacher. This feels like a good sign that the community is getting behind this project, despite their hesitation in the beginning (aggravated by traffickers trying to undermine our work).

95% of Hasta school children advanced to the next grade in April. Since then we have added 21 students to our school family. 8 students have left the school, so our student population is now 60. We have also welcomed 3 new teachers: Asmita Kumal teaches L.K.G and Grade one. Neha Tamang is the assistant teacher for the Nursery/preschool class. Gita Shrestha is an assistant teacher for the Playgroup kids. We are so thankful for all our devoted teachers and amazing support staff.

In May, we were installed a metal roof to shield our courtyard from the elements. This has made it possible for kids to play and assemble outside even in the rainy season (Jul-Oct).



In June, we celebrated Ropain - a Nepali rice planting festival, by planting rice, playing and dancing in the fields!

We have been seeing an urgent need for residential care for girls who are at the highest risk and who live too far from school to walk each day. To address this need, with the love and support of our amazing community, in June we broke ground on the construction of a new headquarters, which will include dormitories for residential

students, offices and vocational training spaces, and a modest home for our Director, Anjali, and her family. We expect to complete the construction by mid 2023. While the new building is being constructed, we have rented rooms for some older girls, here in the village, and are providing tutoring, counseling, food and other services to help them stay in school. We have enrolled them in local government schools as our school only goes up to Class 1. Each year we will be allowed to add one or two classes, so our current students can stay in our school as we grow.



In July and again in August, we had early childhood education experts from Kathmandu, conducting training workshops on early childhood education, English and phonics for our teaching staff. They are from the ECEC program at Kathmandu. They taught our teachers the 'play way' methods to teach the children. Despite the landslide, they came and trained for 10 days about teaching methods,

classroom management and preparation and use of locally available materials. They also offered workshops for parents, and again we were overjoyed with the participation from our school parents.

Personal Message from Anjali

I am very grateful to God for his continuous support and blessings in the work that he has given us. I really feel blessed to work for the community and young girls. My heart is joyful to know that the work that I am doing is changing lives. I really feel grateful for the kind and generous people God sent in my life and in my project to support from their hearts.

The last few months have been very busy, tiring and lots of nights sleepless. Some teachers chose different directions for their lives than they had promised me a month ago. So, they left us. Young girls in the hostel were sick and had to rush to the hospital. Some nights were hard due to the accident that happened with my husband and broke his leg. My plate was full at the time. The school had first terminal exams and administration with teaching some classes was on my head.

I really thank God for His energy, strength and blessings to handle things. I believe many things will happen more but by the grace of God and with Him walking with me, and by the support and love of all my generous supporters from all over the world, the project will move ahead. Thank you all who have blessed and supported me. I am peaceful in my heart for the work that God has given me. Thank you everyone for being part of it.

Visiting Nepal: next year, 12th April to 8th May Ian Guy, Stephen Bond and Tony Pennycuick (Dunedin) will be in Nepal and will spend time with each of our mission partners.

Mainly Music Arrowtown

We have managed to continue Mainly Music during Covid restrictions for the most part all year. Although we did have mask wearing and distancing and ventilation in place as much as



possible. We try to have morning tea outside as much as possible. Sarah sourced a lovely wee play hut which is well used as we have put the toys away to help prevent spread of Covid. Our props get cleaned after each session for this reason. As our team has also been affected (mostly by attrition), we have had Carlton helping out on the Welcome desk which has worked very well. Thank you Carlton, and he also took a session with Holly when my back injury was at its worst. We had some very positive feedback on that session. A big thanks also go to all our team who have had to work under these restrictions and also to Sarah, A and Catherine who have helped out during helper illnesses or absences. Of course, our numbers are down and have been since Covid came but we are enjoying smaller groups and chances for deeper conversations. This week we have even had one Mother inquiring about getting her child baptised.

Sadly, with Amanda's work hours increasing this year, we have lost her amazing presence and help at our sessions. We gave her a farewell morning tea at Jan and Jim Fraser's which turned out to be a beautiful sunny morning so we sat outside and had some lovely conversations and gave her a wee Thank you gift. We do miss her and have to pop into the shop for a catch up from time to time.

As our numbers are down, we have continued to try keep costs down as much as possible too. Because of illness we had to postpone our Easter session but held it belatedly at the beginning of term 2. Mother's Day was also acknowledged during that session with special songs and a flower for each Mum. We used Father's Day gifts unused from lockdown last year for gifts this year. We have been able to return to our Favourites Session at the end of term and using that

Christmas Lunch

The Christmas Lunch 2021 was again a project in partnership with the Salvation Army and Happiness House. As in the previous year the idea behind this was to provide for those feeling isolated and alone and those struggling financially. However, following the QLDC offer of the Memorial Hall the venue moved from St Andrew's. This made set-up and clean-up a little easier and meant that St Andrew's was available Christmas Eve for worship.

Invitations were made through all the church groups and to the various social support agencies in town to invite people known to them. However, for the second year running the response was not as high as we had expected, indicating that the need for such an event was not as anticipated.

Positively it was pleasing to see that many people from within the Church and elsewhere were willing to put in the work to make this a success, and by working together that's exactly what happened - because serving the community, seeing happy faces, and full tummies, and sharing the love of the Lord is always success!

Baskets of Blessing

"Baskets of Blessing have experienced the previous years abundance of product availability and variety, as well as cash donations significantly decreasing. More new charity groups and service providers have appeared, staffing levels have been challenged by frequent illness and supply chains have bee

staffing levels have been challenged by frequent illness and supply chains have been severely impacted. All of these negative influences have occurred at the same time as the demand for our services has never abated, and worse, we still experience periods of escalation e.g. with the onslaught of raising costs (rents, petrol, heating, groceries including the most basic in meat and vegetables), winter illnesses etc

We've seen young families being forced to relocate and we've seen more of the middle age and previously stable population base in the community severely impacted by illness both physically and mentally. We also see the constant stress incurred by many of our owner operators' of small to medium businesses. We've seen support services under extreme pressure and demand. Baskets of Blessing is proud to be placed to be able to assist all of these groups.

Consequently, the demographic that Baskets of Blessing now consistently support has shifted from being a lot of the young migrant sector to more of the long term domestic residential families. We are now supporting more recipients who are fatigued either mentally, physically and financially, or worse, all three! We have a much more fluid recipient dynamic now supporting people more frequently on a short term basis to help them get back on their feet.

While our gift baskets continue to provide uplifting one-time feel good deliveries, our focus on food and meal deliveries now places us as an essential service assisting people at the top of the cliff rather than be the ambulance at the bottom. We know that food hampers and nutritious ready meals can make the difference in their physical and mental wellbeing. For that reason, we are committed to doing all we can, for as many as possible from whatever food resources we can get our hands on. Meanwhile, our separate gift basket operation also continues to give people a mental boost and comfort beyond measure as well just being reminded they are not alone in their woes and that there are people who care about them.

Most people do not realise our Baskets of Blessing current scale of operation. The following stats will help explain our recent volumes;

- With our weekly operation being between 2-4 days a week (consistently every Monday and Thursday but often other days are needed), we can account for 27,732 volunteer hours in the last 12 months
- We have received and delivered to 2524 nominations/addresses which while not consistent every week, this suggests an average of 49 households per week. (Our busiest day ever was to 89 households in one day)

- We have produced and distributed 16,625 meals in a 12 month period, which we hand out in chiller bags of between 10 16 meals per package delivery.
- In 2021 over and above meal packs counted above, we sent out 3409 food boxes. We will beat that number easily in 2022
- During 2021, we produced just under 400 gift baskets even with suspending baskets during the lockdown weeks and a bit beyond, while we concentrated on food. We will again exceed that number in 2022 given we have had no suspension of this gift basket service to date.

The Better English Café

Just the fact we are able to do an "annual report" on the English café is a testimony in itself.

We started up the English café in September 2021, and have been running every Monday, with the exception of public holidays and winter break, ever since.

The purpose for the English café is to create an environment where migrants can come and practice their conversational English skills. We do this by having weekly topics and activities prepared, that helps them with their grammar and builds their vocabulary.



We have come to understand that most the participants enjoy the relational aspect of English café. One thing is what they learn from our English conversations, but many of them stay because it is a place where they can feel connected to a broader part of our Queenstown local community. A few of them even decided to attend Pasta café during the winter break, to stay connected to the volunteers and the Church during July/August.

We have a core group of about 6-8 participants, but we regularly have new faces show up for a couple of weeks to try it out. Some don't join the group permanently (because of work, schedule etc.), others come back occasionally when they have the time.

It is very encouraging to be able to write an annual report for the English café, and to say that we have been able to stay consistent in serving our migrant community for over a year now. Praise God.

Pasta Café 2022

Good news - Pasta Café 2022 was completed without a covid interruption.



Early winter the Church Council decided to run the café for a 4-week season starting on the 22nd July. The decision to continue with this was only made following the offer of Raewyn Byars to organise the event - a huge undertaking for which everyone was very grateful. The event this year



was also made possible by the commitment of YWAM to being there every night with a good crew of keen helpers. We were further blessed by a small grant from Te Hau Toka -Southern Lakes Wellbeing Group and by Kiwi Harvest.

By providing a place of welcome Pasta Café helps to bring people together and build that sense of

community; it breaks down barriers between people, helps overcome stereotypical thinking and also at a very practical level provides some relief to stretched budgets for families and individuals. Over the 4 nights we served over 600 meals - this probably equates to 300 individuals, as many

came more than once.



This year Pasta Café generated more media interest than is usual and we found ourselves reported in local, regional and national media. It is good to have positive stories about the church in the media.

Pasta Café is one of those events that serves the whole community without any expectation of a



Christians Against Poverty is an organisation that works with local churches to provide resources and advice that can free people from debt and help secure their future. Last year a number of our church members trained in this and this year courses have been offered.



The strength of the course is that it is very practical and straight forward, there are no complex elements so anyone can benefit from the course, it is all about developing a positive discipline towards managing your money. The on-line budget sheet is easy to use and very helpful. It is also a great opportunity for non-Christians to be welcomed into a church environment and be blessed by this free course.

The challenges we have found include the number of participants for the latest course, perhaps more thought is needed to advertise wider in the community. Another challenge is the CAP focus on using cash, which in theory is excellent for budgeting but increasingly difficult in our cashless society.

Participants sometimes struggle to commit to three sessions on the same night over the three weeks, and time is also needed at home in which participants come to understand their spending habits and to build their budget.

We encourage the members of the Church to do this course for themselves, to pray for the CAP course and the participants, and to refer others to us.

PROPERTY AND FINANCE REPORT

The Property and Finance group have been active throughout the year. Members of the group are Kim Wilkinson, Convenor; David McNeill, Treasurer; Rev. Ian Guy, Senior Minister; Rev. Carlton Johnstone, Arrowtown Minister; Rev. Clay Peterson de Oliveira, Global Community Minister, Shirley Watson, Church Clerk; Alison Mitchell; Bruce Patton, Keith Patterson and Stanley Swiety. Jim Fraser was also part of the group and retired this year. We have appreciated Jim's input and advice on all matters and thank him for his service over the years.

A lot of our focus this year has been on the two manses the Church owns and the development of the new Arrowtown Manse. The design of the new manse was completed and went out to tender in November 2021. Unfortunately with rising building costs the lowest tender price was greater than expected and this project has been put on hold.

In December 2021 the Douglas Street Manse was put up for auction but failed to reach the reserve price.

Work has been done this year on both the old Arrowtown Manse and the Douglas Street Manse to bring them up to the Healthy Homes standard. Further work to improve the living standards of both manses is planned as finances allow.

The upgrade of the St Andrew's upstairs kitchen was completed and I would like to thank Keith Patterson and his team of volunteers for all the hard work and many hours put in to achieve a fantastic result. This work also included the construction of a small office area at the back of the church.

The maintenance of our buildings and grounds always comes at a financial cost but we are also blessed by the huge number of hours put in by volunteers. This includes work around the grounds, cleaning the inside and outside of buildings, general maintenance and maintaining health and safety protocols for our buildings. This ongoing work done by volunteers is greatly appreciated and I'd like to thank everyone for their efforts.

I'd also like to thank David McNeill our treasurer, Shirley Watson our Parish Clerk, Lita our Church secretary along with the rest of the P&F Group for the assistance I've received over the past year.

Conclusions

With the St Andrew's site being the most valuable piece of land, the St Andrew's Building group has concluded that releasing capital by selling the St Andrew's site is the most practical option for funding a new development. The group also recognises the most desirable place to develop more comprehensive buildings which would incorporate a large worship space would be in the Frankton area.

The group's preferred option would be to develop on a Greenfields site. However, a suitable and affordable site may take a considerable length of time to find.

"Church Council is authorised to...

- take the steps required to sell the St Andrew's site on Stanley Street;
- to progress the search for a suitable Greenfields site;
- to progress a concept plan for the St Margaret's site.
- If a suitable site is not found and a concept plan for St Margaret's has been produced, costed and agreed then the decision can then be made to redevelop St Margaret's and terminate the search for a Greenfields site.
- the sale of St Andrew's would not proceed until one of these two development opportunities is agreed and approved by all relevant authorities."
